## Have Display Cases, Historical Materials; All We Need is Space

During the summer the Pioneers' Museum loaned the Old Colorado City Historical Society a group of display cases for our future museum. They are meant to be an outright gift, if the City Council eventually approves.

Most are lighted units, about five feet long and six feet high. The display area is three feet high and two feet deep, and the length of the case. One case is six feet long.


Later they made available a three-piece shelf and counter unit from a drug store, which will be useful to us for storage, and eventually for display.

### Now in Storage

They are in storage in a building on 21st St., rented by Ralph Conner. One of the conditions of the "gift" was that they be to moved immediately. Ralph supervised moving the cases using manpower hired from the State Employment Service. The treasurer's report lists the expense of the manpower, and rental of a trailer to move the first load. John Keller loaned himself and his pickup truck to help move the drug store cases, to save the Society the trailer expense.

We already have the promise of two display cases from Vera Chambon, who is storing them at her home.

These cases, and historical materials now available, owned by Dave Hughes and from Luther McKnight's estate, mean we can establish an impressive display, once we have a little space. The cases are too bulky to be moved for temporary exhibits, but will stand us in good stead when we have a permanent location.
