United States Air Force Academy history professor, Dr. Jeanne T. Heidler, will present our next program, on Friday, March 8th, 1996, at Trinity United Methodist Church, 701 North 20th Street (just west of Uintah Gardens Shopping Center.

Dr. Heidler will speak to us about the Battle of Glorieta Pass, New Mexico and its tremendous impact on the fortunes of the Confederate States of America. won with the aid of the many Colorado Union sympathizers who rallied to the call of New Mexico's Union officers. A Union defeat would have given the Confederacy access to western gold and silver mines and West Coast ports plus possibly added Colorado and the other western territories to the Confederacy.

Dr. Jeanne T. Heidler was born in Atlanta, Georgia. She received her Master's and Ph.D. from Auburn University where much of her research dealt with the United States Army on the frontier. In 1993, she was appointed as the first permanent civilian faculty member in the Department of History of the United States Air Force Academy. research has continued to concentrate on the military during the Civil War and antebellum periods. She co-authored OLD HICKORY'S WAR: ANDREW JACKSON and the QUEST for EMPIRE, which will be published in April and will be a selection of the History Book Club in May and June.

HAVE STUDENTS CHANGED IN 100 YEARS?

(Some of the sentiments expressed in the following article, abstracted from the COLORADO CITY IRIS, March 3, 1896, are just as appropriate today as they were 100 years ago)

OUR CITY SCHOOLS

The number of new pupils in the city schools has increased nineteen since last month's report. There are now enrolled in the various grades 479 pupils. Of these, 377 attend regularly. The majority of the remainder have either gone elsewhere or have withdrawn from the schools. There seems to be a disposition on the parts of some parents to allow pupils to withdraw from the schools if the pupils happen to feel disinclined to come. At the present time, children are on the streets, when as far as I am able to see, have no business there and who have nothing to occupy their time. Children are not competent judges of what is best for them and parents who humor them in this way display a lamentable lack of judgment. The schools are absolutely free, books, supplies, tuition, everything, and all the sacrifice the parents have to make is to make the children attend.

The attention of the citizen is called to the lack of accommodation for the schools. Should the city continue to fill up during the next six months as it has during the past six months, the room to accommodate the pupils would be wholly inadequate. At the present time, the schools are crowded to their utmost capacity. We have school accommodations for only about 375 pupils. If we, with our city, are to share in the growing prosperity of the Pike's Peak region, generosity must be shown the public schools. No city can grow unless it has adequate school accommodations.

HISTORY CENTER WILL HOST ALDRIDGE BOOK SIGNING

Sprucing up the History Center at 1 South 24th Street is completed, and a new phase of planning, working and fund-raising is beginning, preparing for opening. The History Center's first use will not be as a museum, but to host a book signing.

The public will likely see the remodeled building on March 30th, when we plan a book signing by **Dorothy Aldridge**, with publication of her history of Colorado City. Publisher **Leland Feitz** is generously assisting in making it a special occasion, and visitors will find Dorothy's long-awaited book and a selection of other histories as they view the refinished interior and stained glass windows.

The exterior revitalization of the building went smoothly with local funds and a sizeable grant from the State Historical Society. But the most recent phase - the interior remodeling - faced unexpected problems.

The budget for interior work was \$80,000. Available funds from members, supporters, and Gates and Boettcher foundations left little leeway for added work, but new needs appeared regularly. A heating element cracked, requiring replacement of the dual furnaces. Plans for the restrooms, one small and one handicapped-accessible, were revised because new city codes require two fullsized facilities. It became apparent that new wall surfacing was required throughout the main display area. Ceiling insulation hadn't been included in the original plans, additional steps and framing became necessary, and the opportunity to add storage space arose. Altogether, essential changes or additions threatened to add almost \$22,000 to the interior remodeling cost.

President Lucille Cunningham, Sandy Knox, Chuck Geiss and Mark Cunningham—the Building Committee—worked diligently with architect Michael Collins and Murphy Constructors of Colorado Springs to pare costs. Refinishing the floors was postponed, the drinking fountain was eliminated but later restored, doors and construction details were revised.

The result is a building more handsome than originally conceived, with better facilities and features. The Bed and Breakfast fund-raiser, anonymous contributions, and close figuring by the contractor made it possible.

Much remains to be done. Members buying bricks will help establish the patio. Display cases must be refurbished or constructed. Paving the parking area will cost \$2,300. Shelving and storage is needed so artifacts can be arranged and made accessible, and accessioning must be resumed. Story-telling displays will require many hours of research and preparation. We need capital to supply our Book and Gift Shop. Day to day operation of the Society requires office and computer arrangements.

The expenses of the last few months leave us with few financial resources, so we are working on fund-raising plans. We have space to work and to meet and need no longer mark time waiting for reconstruction.

From early Egyptian nobility through the 1920's Flapper era, Rita Wilhelm's February program was an entertaining, informative history of women's clothing, emphasizing wedding garments, particularly those of the Victorian era (1840-1900). Helping to illustrate her talk were Jan Knox in a white batiste 1810 Empire style with green velvet sash, Heidi Reth in an 1868 dark gray raw silk 2-piece with hoop skirt, Judy Morley in an 1872 ecru batiste and lace (worn with a bustle) and Rita in a lovely white dress from the 1890's.

WEST SIDE MEMORIES TURNING BACK THE CLOCK ON LOCAL EVENTS

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO March 1896

- * Walter Humphrey, T. J. Higgs and Anthony Bott are serving the jury in the district court this week.
- * A couple of Colorado Springs sports residing on N. Cascade avenue hit John Nolon's wheel for \$14,000 at Cripple Creek, Monday night.
- * Charles Campbell, while working on the hill back of THE IRIS this morning, excavated the last two bones of the back-bone of a pre-historic animal. The spinal cord cavity measures 2 ½ x 3 inches, and the bones from outside to outside are 9 x 12 inches. They are on exhibition in the window of THE IRIS office.
- ♣ Geiger & Son, of Manitou, have leased the Anheiser-Busch beer vaults and warehouse, at the corner of Washington and West First streets, and have put in a complete bottling outfit. The machinery has arrived and is being placed in position. The building has been thoroughly repaired and put in first-class shape. They will handle Anheiser-Busch beer exclusively.
- The Board of Trustees of the Town of Colorado City gave a vote of thanks to Mr. N. B. Hames for generously donating a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica to the Woods Library.
- ★ Work was commenced on the Colorado City and Cripple Creek Tunnel last week. This bore will be 22 miles long and cost about \$7,000,000.
- In the case of Samuel Snoddy vs. School District No. 1, before Justice Faulkner Saturday, the plaintiff obtained a judgment for \$10 and costs. Snoddy cleaned the Bancroft cesspool and presented a bill that the board considered excessive.
- Nearly 100 Colorado City people

witnessed James O'Neill's presentation of Monte Cristo at the opera house last night.

- Three appeal suits were filed in the county court yesterday entitled the Town of Colorado City vs. Laura Bell. The defendant was fined by the police magistrate at Colorado City on three counts for selling liquor in less quantities than a gallon, and the fines amounted to over \$200. The defendant appealed the cases.
- * H. B. Quimby, proprietor of the leading West Creek hotel, was in town the first of the week.
- * About 50 people from this city attended Colorado City day at the Leadville Ice Palace.

SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO March 1921


- The Women's Study Club met at the home of Mrs Emma C. Edgar, 2223 W. Colorado avenue. The members participated in a book carnival by dressing to represent some well-known book. There were many unique and original costumes.
- Inmates of the Stratton Home, both children and the aged able to do so, helped fight a fire which raged over the Stratton farm threatening the buildings, virtually all day yesterday. It was caused by a passing steam scoop, being taken to be used in widening of the Canon City road. The smokestack was not equipped with restrainers or other preventives of sparks. The fire was extinguished in the late afternoon.
- The city park commission has placed the Bott park, south of the Midland station, at the disposal of the West Colorado Springs Commercial club, to be used during the coming tourist season as a free camping ground. The park was presented to Colorado City by the late Anthony Bott. It has had no improvements and has

seen little use since becoming part of the Colorado Springs park system after annexation.

- The first of four lectures was delivered last night at the Cheyenne school by Mrs Lloyd Shaw. She spoke on "The Beginnings of Mother Goose Rhymes."
- Mrs. Jeanette Pease, 2620 West Pikes Peak avenue, is a candidate for a two-year term on the City Council.
- **★** Jesse H. Clevy, 57, died at his home (3/8), 3525 West Colorado avenue. Rev. Duncan Lamont will officiate with burial at Evergreen Cemetery.

FIFTY YEARS AGO March 1946

- * At the request of a group of parents, an after-school indoor recreation program for boys of junior high age is being put into effect at the fire station at 29th and Colorado avenue.
- After serving 33 months in the Army, 18 of them in Europe, Harold R. Cline, 2501 W. Vermijo, has been discharged, and has returned home.
- The Whittier P.T.A. Study Group met at the home of Mrs. Kaola Clark, 2731 W. Colorado Ave. Roll call was "Short Cuts to Housecleaning". Newly-elected officers are: Mrs Willa Chasteen, President; Mrs. Mildred Rex, vice-president; and Mrs. Beulah Butler, secretary-treasurer.
- * Of the over 500 regional pioneers who were born here or came in a covered wagon between 1850 and 1870, only one is reported left in the former Colorado City. He is Edward Brown, 3022 West Bijou street. Another, Mrs. Hattie Trout, a long-time resident of old Colorado City, has been at Memorial Hospital for a few years.
- Mr. and Mrs. Gus J. Michaelis have purchased the business at 2504 W. Colorado Ave., from Mr. and Mrs. Paul

- * Cecil T. Arthur, 45, died (3/14) at his home, 1104 West Colorado Avenue. He was an engineer in the state highway department and the son of pioneer residents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Arthur. He was the grandson of the late Henry Templeton, who built the Templeton Block and founded the First Methodist Church of Colorado City, now Trinity Methodist.
- Trester home at 3001 W. Kiowa, was purchased from Mrs G. W. Shriver, by Mr. and Mrs. Chester A. Macrorie, new-comers from Rock Island, Illinois. They are making extensive improvements, including painting, a new green


roof and modernizing throughout. Mr. and Mrs. Macrorie have five daughters and three sons.

- Miss Pattie Sonnekson, 908 W. Colorado Ave., has been appointed professional instructor at the Broadmoor Ice Palace. On March 2, she and her skating partner took third place in the senior pairs event at the national figure skating championships in Chicago.
- \$\dpsymbol{*} 1,800 prisoners of war left Fort Carson for Camp Shanks, New York, on the first leg of their trip back to Germany. So far about 10,800 have been shipped from Carson, leaving some 3,900.

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO March 1971

A record high for the month of March, 81 degrees, was set Friday afternoon (3/27).

* Hambone, Ft Carson's mascot, died at the age of 38 (3/29) He was one of two mules surviving from the days when 1,800 mules were assigned to Carson artillery units. The last survivor "Trotter" is the West Point mascot. Hambone will be buried in front of the 4th Division Artillery Headquarters with other ceremonies planned later. The mule pack artillery was disbanded in December 1956. Hambone was purchased by the rodeo and was known as an outstanding jumper. He performed in many horse shows, rodeos and the annual Pikes Peak Range Riders trek around Pikes Peak.
