
#### **MEETINGS**

### CHRISTMAS IN COLORADO CITY IN THE DAYS OF THE PIONEER

"Christmas along in the sixties was a day of great gladness to us boys reared in Colorado City," said C. W. Kinsman yesterday.

"True we did not have what boys now get for presents, but the simple things we did get brought just as much joy to our young hearts. I remember once when we hung up our stockings beside the wide fireplace, Santa Claus brought us a big red apple. They were the first we children had ever seen, and I shall never forget its delicious flavor. I think I kept my apple a week to look at before I ate it.

"There was a log church where Rouse's shoe shop now stands and it was there I first saw a Christmas tree. It was lit with tiny red candles and held presents for the boys such as suspenders, neckties and yarn scarfs. "It was not uncommon for boys to go barefoot in the early days until after Christmas and then sometimes we got a pair of red top boots with copper toes for a present. A boy with red top boots felt that he was almost a millionaire. We always had plenty of buffalo and cranberries kescreoshrdle-taoihrdletaion venison, but one Christmas we had cranberries to eat with them and I thought they were the most wonderful fruit in the world. We never knew what an orange or lemon was until after the railroad was built, and as for an overcoat, I never owned on until I was 21 years of age. It was a Christmas present from my parents and I felt very awkward in it."

## Dave Hughes Recognized by the Colorado Springs City Council

In November, the Colorado Springs City Council recognized Dave Hughes for his major contributions to the preservation of Old Colorado City.

The Council issued a resolution commemorating the contributions of Dave. This document outlined the following: In the 1970s, as Managing Director of the West Colorado Springs Commercial Club, Dave recognized the historic and economic development potential of Old Colorado City. He skillfully participated in the merger of public and private interests in creating Old Colorado City as an example of economic development using its historic character. He worked with private interests in the city to gain their financial support of this redevelopment project. The Old Colorado City commercial redevelopment project was the cornerstone of the overall

revitalization that has taken place in the entire Westside neighborhood. As a result, the Old Colorado City area has blossomed as a major site of historic and commercial interest to residents and visitors.

Dave has served as a pioneer in the use of personal computers in telecommunications and served the City as a member of the Telecommunications Policy Advisory Committee.

The Council therefore designated the walkway at the easterly end of the platted alley located between West Colorado Avenue and West Pikes Peak Avenue, and between 25th and 26th Streets as the "DAVE HUGHES CYBERPATH". A formal ceremony will take place at the location on January 14, at which time a plaque will be placed.

 $\mathbf{Y}$  We beg to call the attention of our Town Trustees to the Trap-door nuisance which threatens us. The sidewalks, we take it, are public property, and ought to be left intact for the use of the public. Already, however, we have two or three great pit-falls on the principal streets, and, if property-owners are thus allowed to encroach upon the sidewalks in front of their lost, there will soon be nothing left for foot-passengers but the ditches. We also beg to suggest that those who have put down wooden sidewalks should be required to keep them in good repair; in some places they are now very dangerous. In a town where there will always be so many strangers, the foot-ways ought to be kept in especially good order. 10/116 The Colorado Springs Gazette

Υ Major McAllister has a box of uncommonly fine potatoes displayed in his office. We understand that they are Early Goodrich and were grown by Mr. C. R. Husted. 10/18 Colorado Springs Gazette

**Υ** Messrs. Green & Stilzer make quite a show of game in front of the Meat Market on Pike's Peak Avenue--Mountain Sheep and Bear among the rest. They were killed on Thursday on the other side of Pike's Peak. One of the sheep weighed over two hundred and fifty pounds. 10/18 Colorado Springs Gazette

Y We hear that people are continually breaking open the Pound and releasing cattle which have been impounded by the Town Herder. Cannot something be done to bring these pound-breakers and law breakers to justice? There is very little encouragement for a public functionary to do his duty, if after all his trouble, he finds his work of no avail. 9/13 Colorado Springs Gazette

Υ Considerable improvements at Manitou are to be noted. The entire new billiard hall close to the Hotel is nearly finished; it has rather too much upper story to it otherwise, it has a very good appearance. Grace Greenwood's residence is about completed, and makes a tasteful, though unpretentious little cottage. George J. Hanley has almost finished his new store, which is quite an imposing feature. The Bath-House has undergone repairs and improvements. Mr. Nye has opened a Notion Store. 10/18 Colorado Springs Gazette

**Y** Brick or stone, with sheet iron, instead of shingles, for roof-covering, are henceforth to be the rule in Colorado Springs. All the less work for the Fire Company 9/6 Colorado Springs Gazette

#### ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO Fall 1898

Υ A party of Colorado City people spent a delightful hour in the plunge bath at Manitou, this past Tuesday evening. Among those present were: C. D. Taylor and wife, John M. Jackson and wife, R. T. Godfrey and wife, Harry Kneller and wife, Ed Craig and wife, W. F. Benedict and wife, William Richards and wife, W. P. Epperson and wife, Joseph Edell and wife, Mrs. M. W. Stone, Miss Florence, Mrs. Dan Yellowlee, Isaac Kissell, and George Carruthers. 9/3 Colorado City Iris

Υ For the occasion of Colorado Day at the Omaha Exposition, September 9, the Gulf Road will sell tickets from Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo at rates of one cent per mile for the round trip, and from other points in Colorado at one fare rate up to the above points added to the one cent per mile rate. Tickets will be sold on September 7, and will be good for ten days. 9/3 Colorado City Iris

Y The practice of small boys shooting birds in this city has become unbearable to many of our citizens. It is not an uncommon sight to see a half dozen boys armed with bean shooters pelting away at birds in the years of our citizens, oft-times striking the houses Many of these boys are impudent and saucy when asked to stop shooting. The complaint has become general and several citizens threaten prosecutions for bird shooting, which is made punishable by a severe fine under the state law. 9/3 Colorado City Iris

**Υ** The new Colorado Springs militia company will be sworn into the service of the state early next week. 9/3 Colorado City Iris

Y Colorado City was represented in the flower carnival parade by the little children of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Minium. They drove a little donkey hitched to a very small vehicle profusely decorated with sunflowers. 9/3 Colorado City Iris

**Υ** C. W. Kinsman has about completed the organization of a company which proposed the manufacture of plaster paris and hydraulic cement in this city. Mr. Kinsman is familiar with the business and no doubt will succeed in manufacturing a superior quality of plaster paris and cement. *9/3 Colorado City Iris* 

Υ The city council of Colorado Springs has made a tax levy of 17.5 mills for 1899. This levy will raise a fund of \$111,243.03 on a valuation of \$6,356,745. The committee on the fire department reported in favor of adding a steam fire engine to the fire equipment of the city and were vested with power to make the purchase of the engine manufactured by the American Fire Engine company of Seneca Falls, N.Y., which has a capacity of 800 gallons per minute and weighs 7,000 pounds. It cost \$4,500 delivered. 10/22 Colorado City Iris

- Success is rapidly coming to another Colorado City enterprise and the man in charge is not slow in making the most of his opportunities. We refer to the Pike's Peak Brick company. This company is now filling big orders in the Cripple Creek district and is figuring on an order of 2,00,000 for one of the big mining companies up there. In order to meet the great demand for the superior brick this company is making, Mr. Morrison, the manager of the company, has contracted for the most complete and modern plant of brick making machinery in Colorado, which will be put in place as soon as it arrives from the factory. 10/22 Colorado City Iris.
- Υ The potato crop on the divide in the neighborhood of Monument, Table Rock and Eastonville is reported short--hardly worth digging. Further east, along the Rock Island road, the crop is reported good. 10/20 Colorado City Iris
- Y While riding a burro, Sunday, the little a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Credit of Grand View, fell from the back of the animal, breaking her arm in two places near the wrist. Dr. Winternitz set the broken member. 10/29 Colorado City Iris
- **Y** Gus I lames is attending school at the state agricultural college at Ft. Collins, and is well pleased with the school. Gus was given a place on the memorial service program at the Ft. Collins opera house a week ago last Sunday, when memorial exercises were held in honor of the Colorado soldiers who fell at Manila. On that occasion he sang "Break the News to Mother" in a manner which brought forth a storm of applause which resulted in his recall. 10/29 Colorado City Iris
- Y A great many new houses have been erected in West Colorado City his summer and fall. They are without exception, all good houses, and in most instances, are provided with very modern conveniences. 10/1 Colorado City Iris

#### SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO Fall 1923

- Υ The weather last Monday was ideal for the automobile races on the Pikes Peak auto road. Glen Shultz, Colorado Springs racer, won first in 18:47 3-5, which was the fastest time since 1916, when Ralph Ulford set the record at 18:24.8. 9/7 Colorado Springs Independent
- **Y** Motion picture camera men from Denver and Colorado Springs will take pictures of the equal rights memorial pageant at the rehearsal next Sunday in the Garden of the Gods, also at the main performance Sunday, September 23. Representatives from the Pathe, Universal and Fox Film companies will be present. *9/14 Colorado Springs Independent*.
- Υ The edict at Glockner sanitarium that bobbed hair among nurses is taboo, has brought forth quite a bit of comment, pro and con. Many people will agree that a hospital is no place for a flapper, unless following an automobile accident, when she would probably be stripped of all her flapperism but the bobbed hair, and maybe that, where she scalped in the spill, as sometimes happens. If there is really any place for a flapper, it is not in a hospital. When flapperism came in the door, modesty went out the window. 9/14 Colorado Springs Independent
- Υ Colorado Avenue was a busy thoroughfare early Sunday morning. The street railway company pressed into service open cars, closed cars and dinky cars. There was a rush of humanity, equal to an old-time circus day. However, it was a Lord's performance instead of a worldly affair the sunrise prayer meeting in the Garden of the Gods. 9/14 Colorado Springs Independent
- **Υ** The Colorado City W.C.T.U. met in their hall Friday, September 7, and elected officers for the ensuing year, as follows: President, Mrs Zoe Anderson; corresponding secretary,

Miss Ada Wolverton; recording secretary, Mrs. Faye Reifel; treasurer, Mrs. Evelyn Griffin. Superintendents of departments gave their reports of all work done. The organization has had a very successful year, having gained 73 active members and 14 honorary members. Their meetings are always open, and the public is invited. 9/21 Colorado Springs Independent

#### FIFTY YEARS AGO Fall 1948

- Υ West Colorado Avenue had a scene Monday forenoon that was very interesting. Though marring traffic somewhat, everything moved along nicely, especially a five-room house, pulled by an army truck. Perhaps 20 or more men, including city employees, assisted traffic in both directions. Two men were on the roof as lookouts. The house was build at 3709 West Colorado Avenue by Mr. and Mrs. G.O. Leibold, pioneer residents of that area, perhaps 30 years ago. Their home before that was just southeast of Adams Crossing. He died in 1922 and she lives in California. The house was moved to the Whittier school vicinity. The owner of the land will build a larger home on the property. 9/23 Colorado Springs Independent
- **Υ** Clarence Kinsman, of San Luis, Obispo, California, came last week on a visit to relatives and old friends. He grew up here and was a Colorado City business man for years, going to California to reside about 40 years ago. 9/23 Colorado Springs Independent
- Ψ While not as much occupied now as in the busy summer season, the West Side free parking lot on the south side in the 2500 block on West Colorado Avenue is still used and is a safety place from the much traffic on West Colorado Avenue, which is one of the busy thoroughfares of the region.
