French History The Louvre

My wife Becky and I have just returned from three weeks of sightseeing in Europe. We visited many historic places and one of the most impressive was The Louvre in Paris. I thought it would be interesting to share with you some information on the collections in this magnificent facility and how history has been preserved.

The history of Old Colorado City cannot begin to match the scale of the history and artifacts in The Louvre. BUT we do have one thing in common with the Louvre....to preserve the historical stories and artifacts for future generations to enjoy.

The Louvre is a Palace which stands on the site of a fortress (c. 1200) built in the reign of Philippe Augustua. The whole complex of buildings, which cover an area of about 237,000 square yards is three times the size of the Vatican, including St. Peter's. In any event, when you arrive at The Louvre, you are immediately impressed by the massive size and ornateness of the entire complex.

The Louvre Museum presents 30,000 works of art which are divided into several main collections. The oriental Antiquities Arts of Islam presents the civilizations of the ancient Near-East which go back to 7,000 BC and succeeded one another in Mesopotamia, Iran and the countries of the Levant, an immense territory stretching from the Mediterranean to India. The works of art in this section are very impressive and the "age" of the items is almost mind-boggling.

The Egyptian Antiquities illustrates the art of Ancient Egypt from two different view points: a chronological circuit, from the earliest times to Cleopatra, and a theme circuit illustrating certain aspects of Egyptian civilization.

The Greek, Etruscan and Roman Antiquities includes works from three ancient civilizations: Greece, Etrucia and Rome. There is a chronological circuit, based on marble statuary, containing works from the third millennium BC to the 7th century AD. The statues are beautiful and again, when you realize how "old" they are, you are immediately impressed on how many centuries they have been preserved.

There are European sculptures from the Late Middle Ages to the mid-19th century in another section. These collections, which mainly include French works, also contain many significant pieces from Italy, Spain and Northern Europe.

In the Objects d'art section, the collections come from every era: items from the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, decorative arts from the 17th and 18th centuries, the Crown Diamonds, 19th century items and items of furniture from Napoleon III apartments.

The collection of paintings cover the history of European painting from the mid-13th century to the mid-19th century. They are divided into three main groups: the French School, the Italian and Spanish Schools, and the Northern European Schools.

The prints and drawings area consists of over 100,000 works and may are extremely fragile and are on display only as temporary exhibits.

For those of you who have also visited The Louvre, I hope that you would agree that it is a very impressive facility. History is everywhere and we left with a good understanding of the history of each ear that was displayed in the collections.

I came back with a renewed interest in preserving the history of Old Colorado City. (the little Louvre of the Rockies???)


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MEETINGS

From the Board

Our research library holds many interesting tales and secrets. In one of Jan MacKell's manuscripts we learn that one of Cripple Creeks famous madams, Blanche Burton, retired from that city and came to reside at 812 West Colorado Avenue, away from the red-light district and became a noted recluse.

A portiere in her home caught fire, after a lamp was over turned, and a man was seen running from the residence. She caught fire, apparently in an attempt to quell it, and ran screaming up Colorado Avenue until fireman caught her to douse the flames. Her burns were too scrious and she succumbed as a result.

Since no monies, bank books or other assets were found she would have been buried in Paupers field: however, a well known madam in Old Colorado City paid for her funeral.

Quite a few years later Bill Henderson, former mayor of Colorado Springs, President of Pikes Peak National Bank and a historian, gave such a moving story of her life and death to the Garden of the Gods Rotary Club, that the club donated monies for a head stone for her grave and it was erected in 1983 on the anniversary of her death.

It was discovered that the day before her demise she had purchased a ton a coal for needy families in time for Christmas.

And speaking of memorials, with Y2K on the horizon what better way to meet the millennium than to honor your father, mother, sister(s), brother(s), close friend, an ancestor, even yourself, by purchasing a commemorative brick for our east courtyard. OCCHS, she wondered" Who are we cooking for?"

When she learned about the OCCHS, she and Jim joined and she has been a faithful volunteer. Virginia is a musician and singer. She has sung in church choirs for sixty years and has been a director for twenty.

They have a daughter, Sheryl Shepard, who is a music teacher for District 20 in Pueblo. They have two grand-daughters and two great grandsons.

Since 1972 they spend three winter months at CTurks and Caicos, a British Island where they own an island home.

If you want an exciting, informative book to read or give as a gift, you need look no farther than the OCCHS book store.

To whet your curiosity I'll gave you a tease on one.

One bitter December in 1907 when train Number One on the Denver Pacific Railroad braked in Fraser, Colorado a startling tiny figure emerged: a well-dressed young woman carrying a little black bag and a small white dog. Her name was Dr. Susan Anderson and she had a broken heart and a bad case of tuberculosis.

To find out about her true adventures as a Country Physician in the Colorado Rockies look for "Dr.Susie" in the OCCHC book store.

For mysteries, in 1877 J.T. Schlessenger, Secretary to General Palmer was found dead in a valley in Ute Pass. The body bore a bullet hole though the heart, covered by a daintily placed handkerchief. Lover? Jealous suitor? No one knows. Tis rumored it was a duel. The case was never solved.

Westside Historian Mel McFarland will Present "Colorado Springs: the History in Pictures".........

at the Society meeting in October. He is a native Westsider with a nationwide reputation as a historian.

Edward "Mel" McFarland's slide presentation is titled "Colorado Springs: the History in Pictures." Most of the photos are more than 40 years old and cover the Westside and Manitou Springs as well as Colorado Springs itself.

Mr. McFarland has published two books on the region's railroads: "Midland Route", 1980, dealing with the Colorado Midland, and "The Cripple Creek Road", 1983, giving the history of the Midland Terminal railroad.

He lived at a half-dozen houses on the westside when he was growing up, sometimes with the railroad all but lying in his back yard. His interest in railroad history, coupled with a hobby of photography, started him collecting pictures, some of which he'll show at the meeting.

He also has hobbies of model railroading, old cars and art.

You're From Colorado City? So, How Many Wives Do YOU Have?

We're proud when friends associate us with Colorado City. But to avoid embarrassment, be sure your companion isn't thinking of recently incorporated Colorado City, ARIZONA.

That town was begun during the depression by excommunicated Mormons who wanted to continue the polygamy outlawed by the Mother Church. It has 1,700 people, about half of them children. One man is said to have fathered 80.

Leroy Johnson, founder and spiritual leader, established the town across the Grand Canyon from the rest of Arizona. "Uncle Roy" 98, took his 16th wife in 1984. Thirteen wives survive.
