Winfield Scott Stratton Come Visit With

The March OCCHS meeting will be held on Friday the 12th at the Center. The program will feature Richard Marold, who will portray Winfield Scott Stratton and will talk about the various facets of Stratton's life and day.

Stratton was born in Indiana in July, 1848. He arrived in Colorado Springs inn 1872 and opened a carpentry shop on Pikes Peak Avenue. By 1874, Stratton became interested in prospecting and mining. He began spending his winters as a carpenter in Colorado Springs to pay for his prospecting activities during the summers.

As a lark, he went prospecting with his friend, Bob Womack, in the Cripple Creek area. He bought several claims on Battle Mountain in the Cripple Creek District without much success. Then, in an abandoned area of his Independence Mine he discovered a rich vein of gold in July,

He was one of the most colorful, lucky, unlucky—and viewed one way, tragic—of the major figures to populate Colorado Springs in the early days. He didn't cut the public figure or the social swath of founder William J. Palmer. In many respects he was the more genuinely human (and interesting) of the two. His unbreakable will and testament has been a study tool at legal institutions. Upon his death, Stratton's estate created the Myron Stratton Home, named for his father.

Richard Marold is the Executive Director of the Cheyenne Mountain Heritage Center. He previously presented a program for us in costume and character as Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw.

You will not want to miss this interesting, entertaining, and informative program. Mark your calendars *now* and plan on attending.

The January OCCHS meeting was held at the Center with about 50 members and visitors attending. The speaker for the meeting was our own, Paul Idleman, Director of the Old Colorado City History Center. Paul is very knowledgeable on the history of the West and especially on the interesting and colorful history of the Pikes Peak Region. He has been a recent speaker on this topic at the Garden of the God's Visitor Center and at several local schools.

Paul presented a slide history of Old Colorado City using photos, maps and research from the History Center's collections. He originally had been planning the program as an orientation for History Center docents. Training for summer docents will begin soon. This program and others will be given to help train volunteers who are interested in guiding visitors to the History Center through Old Town's history.

In his presentation, Paul reviewed the early expeditions into this area by several groups. It was very informative to

be able to relate the paths of these expeditions to the local geographic area. He covered in detail the establishment of the town of Colorado City and many of the trials and tribulations that people encountered in the early days of the town's existence. He related the tremendous growth during the gold rush days and subsequent mining activities. During this growth period, the city became a "rough and touch" western town. Associated with this growth, were the stories of "saloon row" and the "ladies of the night." He then brought into perspective the settling of Colorado Springs by William Palmer. Many interesting facts were presented about the "conflicts" between the two towns, which continued over a span of many years.

Members who attended the meeting left with a good perspective of the major activities that occurred during the founding and lifetime of Colorado City. Thank you Paul, for this fine presentation.
