THE SHORT LINE

The Gold Camp Road By Don Ellis

My family moved to the Gold Camp Road in 1944, and Gold Camp Road history

gradually seeped into my life. The

road got the name "Goldcamp Road" in 1940 because the Colorado Springs Chamber of Commerce and the town officials of Cripple Creek and Victor promoted that name which they thought would, "prove highly beneficial ... as it calls attention to the most famous gold field of Colorado and the entire United States." But, for another ten years or more, my father called it "the Corley Road." And, he told about a man named W. D. Corley who bought the bankrupt Cripple Creek

Short Line Railroad and made its roadbed into a toll road, the Corley Mountain Highway, which he operated from 1924 until 1939.

Even my earliest experiences living on the Gold Camp Road harkened back to an earlier time. With World

War II gas rationing, tour limousines

were temporarily replaced by horse drawn wagons in which tourists rode slowly by in the open.

When our family drove the Gold Camp Road in the '40's and '50's there were still over a dozen buildings at Rosemont, including Rosemont's historic hotel. Aside from Bear Creek Canyon, this was the most populated area along the Gold Camp Road. Everyone on the Gold Camp Road from Colorado Springs to Rosemont, and possibly to Clyde, had the same

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RODEO HONORS HUGHES

The August 64th Pikes Peak Rodeo Parade in downtown Colorado Springs honored Retired Colonel

Dave Hughes for his being named a 2004 West Point 'Distinguished Graduate.' They invited him to ride in the Parade as the Grand Marshal. There was a little humor in their uncertainty before they invited him, whether 76 year old Dave could handle a horse at all and at that age! He pointed out he grew up with horses on the Hughes ranch (with the Lazy T/O brand) east of Kiowa and even, as a teenager rode in the National Western Stock Show and Rodeo in 1945! Heck yes he could ride!

He declined their invitation to provide a horse from the Air Force Academy stables, and got his own mount – a big, black, beautiful Morgan from a stables next to the Garden of the Gods – which has operated since 1937.

He would pay for the use of the horse, saddle and bridle, horse trailer, truck, and stable wranglers to get it to and from the Parade area. 5 hours of work by 3 men.

But he also was determined to wear his splendid black military style coat with West Point crests as buttons, one brace of medals – including the Distinguished Service Cross and three Silver Stars, his Custer era black cavalry officer's Stetson instead of his customary white cowhand Stetson, and on the hat, a set of gleaming crossed sabers with the number '7' above them on the hat front – the very officers insignia he had worn on his collar in the Korean War in the 7th Cavalry Regiment.

But he went further. He strapped on a valuable 1861 Union officers Cavalry Sword from his personal collection that was used in Colorado during the Civil War, possibly at the Battle of Glorieta Pass.


Well, the Parade went off well, and many of the 20,000 who watched commented to him and the wranglers what a great looking horse he rode. In fact it outshined the rather small horses loaned to the two Generals from the Air Force Academy and Fort Carson who rode behind the Grand Marshal.

The stable was so pleased at the praise their horse got, they donated the whole effort.
