A few rip roaring stories from the 1890s have come down to us about 'Prairie Dog O'Byrne. The man with a carriage pulled around Colorado City by two antlered Elk.

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generously given the Society his rights to the book. But the Society will have to pay for the printing of 1,000 copies soon, which will cost \$4,670. It will then sell for \$7.95. It will take over 3 years to recoup the cost, then make the \$3,280 overall profit over maybe 3 more years.

We also have to do some needed building repairs that we estimate will cost \$1,000 or more.

So altogether we project in the approved 2006 budget a deficit of \$7,846 in operations over this next year. Good luck, new fund raising ideas, generous donors, more members, more promotion of our events, more museum foot traffic could offset that projected loss.

Offsetting projected losses in another way, is the progress we have been making managing our interest bearing investments. The Board, taking into account the interest we earned last year, interest carryover from 2004, and its ability to tap into our T-1 account balance, decided to renew the \$67,000 Endowment CD when it matures on March 1st. In view of rising interest rates, it boldly agreed to raise the fixed and 'untouchable' Endowment fund to \$80,000, up from \$67,000 all in a CD earning right now 5% interest. Which may go a quarter point higher.

Thus, over the year we expect to earn a minimum of \$4,300 in interest between our Endowment CD, and interest from the 4.5% Fed T-1 variable rate operating account we have at Pikes Peak Bank.

At this point, unless we gain more outside revenue, we will have to spend, over the year, at least \$7,000 of earned interest, current year and accumulated from last two years, if we are to break even overall by December. The Bylaws of our Society permit the Board to spend, for general purposes, the earned interest from its fixed Endowment. At this point it looks like we will have to. Overall we are in sound fiscal shape.
