
Old fashion tea time

HIGH TEA

Anna, the Duchess of Bedford (1788-1861) is credited as the creator of teatime. Because the noon meal had become skimpier the Duchess suffered from "a sinking feeling" at about four o'clock in the afternoon. At first the Duchess had her servants sneak her a pot of tea and a few breadstuffs. Adopting the European practice proved so popular, the Duchess continued it when she returned to London sending cards to her friends asking them to join her for "tea and a walking the fields." The practice of inviting friends to come for tea in the afternoon was quickly picked up by other social hostesses. During the second half of the Victorian Period, known as the Industrial Revolution, working families would return home tired and exhausted. The table would be set with any manner of meats, bread, butter, pickles,

cheese and of course tea. None of the dainty finger sandwiches, scones and pastries of royal afternoon teas would have been on the menu. Because it was eaten at a high dining table rather than the low tea tables, it was termed "high" tea.

A Brief History

Tea emerges from legend over 500 years ago when it was "discovered" by the emperor Shen Nong. While boiling his drinking water, dried leaves from a nearby bush fell into the water and the result—TEA! Ever since, the influence of tea has permeated every aspect of the Chinese society and culture. As trade routes were opened, tea quickly gained popularity in the West. Today, it is ranked second only to water as the world's most consumed beverage. Throughout history, tea has influenced world politics and shaped

international events. From the British colonization of India, to the Boston Tea Party, tea has played an integral role in global trade relations. Native to China, *Camellia Sincensis*, the tea plant, is now cultivated throughout the world. Today, tea plantations in India, Japan, Sri Lanka, Taiwan, Africa and Indonesia produce most of the world's tea.



The Origin of the Scone

This Scottish QUICK BREAD is said to have taken its name from the Stone of Destiny (or scone), the place where Scottish kings were once crowned. The original triangular-shaped scone was made with oats and griddle-baked. Today's versions are more often flour-based and baked in the oven. They come in various shapes including triangles, rounds, squares and diamonds.

Own a Piece of History


Wouldn't it be wonderful to own a piece of history that dates from the earliest days of Colorado City? Well, your Society is doing something that will make a piece of history available to you. The historic log cabin, now located in Bancroft Park, is the oldest structure from the Colorado City days. It dates back to 1859 and your Society has finished renovating the building with the help of a grant from the State Historical Society. During this renovation, and previous renovations, original logs from the building have been removed. We have taken two of these logs and sliced them into one-inch thick pieces. Each log cut is engraved with the following:

"This crosscut, removed during repairs, came from an original log of the historic cabin erected in Colorado City in 1859, now in Bancroft Park.

Certified True – Old Colorado City Historical Society, June 2003"

These log mementos are offered as a limited edition to members of the Society and other historians. The logs are numbered and will be issued in a limited set of 100. With each log, the purchaser will receive a parchment Certificate of Authenticity, signed by the President of the Old Colorado City Historical Society.

We are currently taking orders for the logs. The cost for each log is \$25 (no discounts), plus \$5, if the log is to be mailed.



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Treasurers Report

April 2006

Not much of importance to report this April. As spring is in the air, and the historical hedgehogs come out of their holes, things are picking up. Plans are being made for income from our Victorian Tea, Territory Days booth and cabin Bake Sale. We have to shell out \$65 for a rider on the Territory Days organization for insurance.

\$367 of new and renewed memberships - including another \$150 lifetime membership have been added this month. A \$70 Paypal order for 5 books from our online bookstore has come in. And queries are being made about buying photos they have spotted on our Web site.

The utility bill is falling, and more people are coming in the door. Many schools are having their 'field trips' visiting Old Colorado City so we should see lots of little faces inside, all asking to ring the church bell in our belfry. I have replied to over 20 schools and parent groups via the Internet asking about museum visits.

Friends of Bev Disch and family, made \$660 in Memorial Donations in the name of her deceased son. Those go into the permanent Endowment fund.

Meanwhile our \$80,000 CD is happily earning \$359 a month from the latest 5.38% Fed interest rate, and our T-1 Bill is earning at a 4.63% rate, with higher rates hinted at in Washington.

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RESEARCH LIBRARY NEWS

The Research Library began with two large donated collections and has grown annually due to smaller, but valuable donations.

The collection covers a wide spectrum: History of the West, History of Colorado, History of the Pikes Peak area, and specifically, the History of Old Colorado City.

Researchers of Colorado and Pikes Peak area history have a wide area of materials to choose from. This material can be found in the Library Index (a version of a card catalogue) indexed by a standardized Dewey Decimal System. All books and pamphlets have a Dewey Decimal number and can easily be located on the shelves. Magazine articles can easily be located in the Index to the Colorado Heritage Magazine, the Index to the Colorado Magazine, and the Brand Book Index.

The smaller, but most heavily used part of our collection, is the information dealing with genealogy, location of property, and history of both families and property in our local area. For this research, Polk's City Directories of Colorado Springs, Colorado City, and Manitou Springs are invaluable. We also have a packet of "How to Research the History of Your House" that directs users to other source materials from El Paso County and the State of Colorado.

We ask all researchers to use the materials "in-house" <u>and</u> to wear the white gloves that are provided for the needed preservation of these library materials.
