ANOTHER 150 YEARS!

We hear about 'back in the good old days', but do you think the founders of Colorado City in 1859 envisioned what life would be like in 150 years?

Thousands were coming to the region during the 1858 Pikes Peak or Gold Rush hoping to find gold in the foothills and mountains south of Denver's Cherry Creek gold strike, M. S. Beach and Rufus Cable thought the convergence of Camp Creek into Fountain Creek near the entrance to today's Ute Pass was a good location to create a with business and government opportunities and to service miners going into the mountains. On August 12, 1859, they organized the town ... 150 years ago! The town was platted and lots were sold. Irving Howbert's book, Memories of a Lifetime in the Pikes's Peak Region, gives a first-hand account of what Colorado City was like when he and his father arrived in late summer of 1860.



Volunteer Spotlight - meet Muriel Dunkley

Although born and raised in Suffolk, England, Muriel Dunkley is clearly comfortable and secure with her surroundings here in Colorado. Muriel came to America on the Mauritania the day after Labor Day in 1957 and has been here ever since. A school friend of hers in England married an American serviceman and not long after they moved to the United States, she followed.

She stayed briefly with them in Las Animas and eventually all three moved to Colorado Springs. Then, for about 5-1/2 years she taught school in Dodge City, Kansas, during which time she met her husband-to-be. They married in 1961 and moved to Chipeta Park, Colorado. She stayed at home for 12 years while raising their son, then returned to teaching in District 12, where she taught for 20 years. Later, she and her husband moved to Colorado Springs where she still resides.

Muriel learned about the Old Colorado City Historical Society through a friend, Jim Travis, a lawyer and father of one of her first graders. Jim was also involved with the Historical Society. Like many other Society's members, she started attending the Friday morning programs and then got recruited as a volunteer by Bev Disch in 2001.

She works primarily in the History Center bookstore, but has been involved in other events such as the Victorian Tea and the annual Bed & Breakfast tour. When asked which event is her favorite, she says she absolutely loves working the Cemetery Crawl because of its physical beauty and serenity. She adds that one of the side benefits of working here is that she has made many close friends, many of whom are also retired educators.

One valuable lesson she's learned since being involved with the History Center is the importance of taping those endearing stories from older family members and friends. She tells of her 80 year old neighbor who lived on the West Side for most of his life. She once had asked him if she could tape him as he recalled his favorite days gone by, but never followed through. She regrets letting that golden chance slip by, because he is no longer living.

In addition to her volunteer work at the History Center, Muriel also keeps busy volunteering at her church and at Westside Cares, an organization that helps people in need. She also has an intense love and passion for tutoring persons of all ages, especially the children.

One of her favorite ways of relaxing is serving afternoon tea using her 100 year old tea service to her friends. "It's like having an old fashioned tea party", she says with a smile. She muses that even the young girls who attend her teas come dressed up and almost automatically begin to act in a grown-up, lady-like manner.

To Muriel, Old Colorado City has its own cham, including an intriguing history and a feeling of independence. "There's a sense of security in a small town, a sense of permanence and stability, especially on the West Side". The idea of going back in time to the exciting days of Old Colorado City doesn't interest her in the least, neither does moving back to England, at least for now. Her immediate family is here, and like she says, that sense of security is what's most important.



CHANGES ON WEST COLORADO AVENUE

Walking today along the 2400 block of West Colorado Avenue, you will see that a longtime business is leaving and another is returning!

A RETURNING BUSINESS is the Simpich family new business located at 2411 and 2413 W. Colorado Avenue.

Two years ago, the Bob Simpich family closed their Simpich Character Dolls business to retire, but did not sell the building or their unique designs to be copied in China or elsewhere!

Youngest son, David, and his wife have great plans for the building and its use. The upstairs has been sold and is being renovated into four loft condos. The downstairs at street level is returning as the "Simpich Showcase" which is being converted into a museum displaying their vast Simpich doll collection, an art gallery, and a marionette theater featuring David's talent as a professional puppeteer. What a charming combination at this site for all ages and interests!

During this process of renovation and remodeling, the issues of many permits, building firewalls, and up-grading to current building codes have delayed the project completion. In fact, a business had to move out temporarily and store their merchandise while the dust settled! Even the pigeons moved! Kathy Read's Needleworks by Holly Berry is again open for business.

In October, David Simpich presented an entertaining program, "A Westside Family Business: Then and Now" at the History Center. He talked about the ups-and-downs of a family business outgrowing their home in Manitou Springs and growing up among paints, dolls in varying stages of construction, customers coming to their home, and chores. Much laughter was shared with his parents, Bob and Jan Simpich, who were in the audience. As a child, David had a special interest in their doll display showcase and later urged his parents to open a retail shop. The Simpich's bought their Old Colorado City building in the late 1970s. Their business grew and they kept expanding into other locations for manufacturing and shipping. When their closing after 50 years of business was announced in the local Gazette newspaper, the next morning there were over 300 people lined up outside waiting to come in and place orders and purchase existing inventory!

Their publication has been a "heartbeat" of the Westside and nearby neighborhoods recording local history, reporting on many civic issues, sharing stories of residents, and drawing attention to current views and concerns.

David demonstrated several marionettes illustrating their construction, personalities, and versatility for use in additional roles. The audience was delighted as David used his unique talent in theater art while telling a story as well as his childlike magic in creating a scene to stimulate our imagination. Thank you, David! A BUSINESS CLOSING is the Michael Garman Gallery at 2418 W. Colorado Avenue across the street from Bancroft Park.

Due to illness, Michael Garman, local artist and sculptor, is retiring and closing his retail display gallery in Old Colorado City as well as his production facility. Production of his sculptures continued through November 1, and the remaining stock is being sold into next year. Plans have not been revealed for possibly relocating his popular "Magic Town", a well-known tourist attraction, or future use of the building which is for sale.

Garman had scheduled a "sculpture signing" event on Saturday, November 22, but this had to be rescheduled when a portion of the upper story brick façade collapsed suddenly onto the sidewalk the afternoon before! When the dust settled, there was great relief that no one had been injured! A historic restoration company has been hired to repair the roof and brick façade. The cause of this problem has not been totally determined, but the roof had been undergoing some repairs. However, the gallery is open again for business...at least for a limited time.

Their presence on "the Avenue" will be missed by many customers.

- * An original Colorado "Governor Peabody" medal presented to persons who were instrumental in helping break the miners' strike in Colorado City, Cripple Creek, Telluride, and Trinidad in 1903-1904, from OCCHS member Dave Hughes

Our thanks to everyone who so graciously parted with these treasured items. It is through the generosity of people and organizations such as those above that enables the museum to continue telling the story of life as it was during the days of Old Colorado City and early El Paso County.

COME SEE OUR NEWEST EXHIBIT

If you're captivated and fascinated by books and documents dating back to the late 1800s and early 1900s, then you need to see our new Archives exhibit.

The exhibit showcases prized items from various aspects of everyday life in the days of Colorado City, including business and commerce, social and cultural, academia and literary works.

As an example, come gaze upon an 1894 stock certificate for shares in the Isabella Gold Mining Company and a tax receipt dated 1896 from the El Paso County Treasurer's Office. Take a look at Gen. W. J. Palmer's 1901 rail pass and imagine him leafing through the detailed, informative 1902 Colorado Midland Railway schedule as he picks out routes for his next business trip.

There's a printed program from a delightful play entitled "Carnival of Commerce" put on by the Ladies Town Improvement Society and held at the Waycott Opera House in 1906. For those of you ladies interested in fashions, feast your eyes on a pattern magazine, printed in color, depicting gorgeous dress fashions one can sew "for the promenade".

There are numerous other items on display, from a thick, fat 1889 Webster's dictionary to a tiny booklet with black and white photos and written text entitled, "Colorado City - The Gem of the Foothills".

The exhibit is located in the corner to the far left as you enter the museum area.

November Treasurer's Report

As we approach the end of 2008 which as low-income (only \$22,000 projected) and high-cost (painting building - \$6,800 - and furnace replacement - \$2,700), and no-more-interest-on-our-savings, your Board took a hard look at what is coming up in 2009.

Now 2009 is our Sesquicentennial Year! We want to celebrate it properly, culminating in quite a celebration around August 12th, 2009 – which is the actual 150 year Anniversary of the founding of Colorado City.

So the Board agreed, for planning purposes before the 2009 Budget is finally approved by Tanuary.

To allocate \$5,000 out of our Savings for a Special Sesquicentennial Activities Budget beyond our normal operating budget. That will cover such things as the creation of a special Logo, for an artist's fee for designing a monument, costs to distribute widely in numerous publications – the Hub, possibly the OWN Newsletter, the Westside Pioneer, a special '150 Years of History' insert, and incidental costs for activities such as a Parade, an Annual Dinner.

We have been quoted by Wilhelm Monuments \$11,500 cost to create a 6 foot etched red granite monument memoralizing 150 Years of Early El Paso County, the original Colorado City, and the Westside's History to be placed on the concrete slab next to the Bancroft Park. That slab was erected there 37 years ago when the Park was redesigned and the Cabin renovated, just waiting for the appropriate, and only, memorial for Colorado City's long history.

By December 20th, after the Park Board approves our plan, we are pursuing a Grant for the bulk of the total cost. We expect to conduct a fund raising across the Westside, including the opportunity for school children to contribute to 'their' neighborhood monument.

So we face a year of fiscal challenges. But then one is 150 Years old, only once!
