It is not the grace and grandeur of the old homes that dot Manitou, Colorado Springs and Old Colorado City, but the history of the people who built and lived in those homes that bring so many people out to the OCCHS Holiday Tour. In the past we have toured the 1874 wellness clinic built circa 1874 of Dr. William Bell, the founder of Colorado Springs, the historic 1885 hotel in Cascade now called Eastholme in the Rockies Bed and Breakfast,




Old Town Guest-House, built on the site of Colorado City's second City Hall which was built in 1890 housed Colorado City's third fire department and later the police department, The McAllister House, home of a Civil War Major who served under General Palmer (now a museum) along with so many others.





# Treasurer's Report

### Members Rise to the Occasion Repairs in Progress

Great News (but I expected no less from our members) one donation at a time added up and we exceeded the amount required to receive the matching funds of \$2,000 from the local business that wanted to help in the repairs needed to OCCHS due to this last summer's flooding. I am also happy to report that we are "dry" in the basement.

Summer rains, along with settling of our foundation allowed for gallons of water to make its way into our basement and the Archive Department (through cracks in the foundation and down the outside stairs). As reported previously, no archival material was damaged, and the overabundance of humidity which can be detrimental to archival material has been decreased.

If you stop by the center, you will see the new addition. A cover over the basement stairs is up and work on a door to that cover is still in process. We are still raising funds to complete a door on the front, but water no longer pours in down the stairs and under the door AND it has stopped the vagrant person from using the stairwell as a "restroom".

You can also notice that the concrete around the building now slops away from the building and gaps in the foundation have been filled.

Most of this work is thanks to Leo and Miki Knudson and Dave and Sharon Swint. They not only hired the contractors to get the work done, but worked in the take down of flooring and walls that were damaged due to water and did a lot of the labor themselves, including painting.

Expenses to date on this project are: \$4,65417

Donations received to date with matching funds are: \$5,290
