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Uncovering Mysteries at OCC History Center!

On August 4 and 7, Jane Crisler, a Denver historic structure architect, and Victoria Ryan, a Colorado Springs art conservator and experienced collections specialist, arrived at our museum to begin their assessment of our building, archives, procedures, and volunteer staff. While OCCHS volunteers showed them around our entire building many questions were asked. Some answers required a ladder, measuring tape, flashlight, or hammer!

All of this activity was part of a 2014 Conservation Assessment Program (CAP) grant A \$7000 grant was

awarded by the national Heritage Preservation non-profit organization in cooperation with the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services. The grant's goals are to identify conservation needs of collections and historic buildings and recommend ways to correctly improve collections and building conditions.

What we did not know last month includes ...

- * 1910 remodel and addition
- * False ceiling revealed steps to baptistery and location of the baptistery!
- * "ancient" basement plumbing
- * Inside of bell tower is quite large
- * Current stained glass windows had been covered when building was purchased

Victoria and Jane met with at least 11 OCCHS members in small groups or a one-on-one level working in photo archives, collections and exhibits, the treasurer, members of the OCCHS Board, maintenance, and even the cleaning lady!

Special thanks go out to longtime members, Ralph Conner and Lucille Cunningham, for their detailed reports and comments found in our archives. Additional thanks to West Word editors and the Westside Pioneer for their reports of happenings through the years.

Final comprehensive reports aren't due until late September. At that time, we will have their recommended priorities of action as well as suggested resources. They left us with some clear directions of where to begin our improvements. They shared many, many compliments on the successes our volunteers have achieved and our shared enthusiasm for Old Colorado City history. Later this year, a newsletter article will report again giving members a better idea of directions and goals the Board decides to implement Stay tuned!



A Ticket to Tomahawk...the rest of the story

For those of you who braved the cold, rainy night of July 29th to attend the last of the Tuesday night movie series, OCCHS would like to thank you and sympathize with you at the same time. Those attending all know that at 8:18 p.m., our movie A Ticket to Tomahawk was abruptly ended by a power failure all over Old Colorado City. Lighting hit a transformer near Cucharras and 2.1st Street and put a large area of the west side in the dark. After waiting it out for about twenty minutes, it was decided to cancel the performance and send everyone home. Because of new exhibits that were opening

the next day in our assembly room, it was impossible to reschedule the movie.

But because we were forty-five minutes into the film, several people have called and wanted to know what happened in the rest of the story. So, for those of you who are anxiously awaiting this information, we offer a synopsis of the missing forty-five minutes of the movie.

The Cast:

- Dan Daily as Johnny
- Walter Brennan as Terence Sweeny
- Anne Baxter as Kit Dodge Jr.
- Rory Calhoun as Dakota
- Chief Yowlachie as Pawnee
- Charles Kemper as Chuckity

As you may remember, the film got cut off just shortly after Johnny Behind-the-Deuces (Johnny) performed a card trick for Kit and Pawnee. After everyone was a sleep, the three men who showed up earlier claiming to be telegraph men (who were actually Dawson's henchmen), threw five sticks of dynamite under the engine to prevent its' arrival in Tomahawk. But Johnny smelled the fuse burning and Kit



put the fuse out by shooting off the end of the fuse. The next day, Indians attacked the group, but Johnny spotted the Arapaho chief, Crooked Knife whom he knew and made plans to go talk to him. He learns that Long Time, the Chinese Laundry man, has a load of fireworks with him. Long Knife informs Johnny that he will have to demonstrate great powers to his tribe if they are going to help instead of attack. Johnny sends Kit and Chuckity up on a hill above the Indian camp. Johnny arrives in the camp and Long Knife (after a short powpow in the Chiefs tent) introduces Johnny to the tribe. Johnny lights a roman candle firework which is the signal to Kit and Chuckity to start the massive display going off. The Indians are convinced of Johnny's great power and agree to help get the locomotive over the mountain.

The next scenes show the dismantled locomotive being carried by all the cast in pieces (which was one of the reasons Director Richard Sale ordered the replica engine, because the lightweight parts could be easily removed.) Johnny carried the whistle, Kit carried the builder's plate, the dance group carried the Emma Sweeny name boards, etc.

The group finally reaches the start of track on the other side of the mountain and notes that someone has filled the water tank. full of bullet holes. She finally realizes that Dakota isn't who he said he was and learns he works for Dawson. Johnny tries to stop him from his getaway, but Dakota slugs him and forces Sweeny to put the engine in high gear down the track. Johnny and Kit jump on the back of the tender (that part of the engine that carries the wood and water) and soon Johnny and Dakota are fighting each other on top of the locomotive. Finally, Kit get a clear shot at Dakota and with her knife. fells Dakota to the bottom of the gorge. Out of nowhere, comes Dawson with the rest of his men and they proceed to fill the Emma Sweeny boiler full of bullet holes. But the Indians ride up and take care of Dawson. But by this time, the engine has lost all it's steam because of the holes in the boiler and it stops dead just five-hundred feet short of the Tomahawk city limits.

Out from town comes all the town folk and the Tomahawk City Council. At first they are stubborn and won't give in on the shortfall, but Johnny finally convinces the council to move the town limits sign to the rear end of the engine tender.

Sheriff Dodge is there (Kit's father) and she tells him that she and Johnny are going to get mamied. But Johnny tells Kit that he will always be a roamer and that he is not the man for her. He's taking the first train back east.

The scene changes as Johnny is trying to find Kit to say goodbye. The audience soon learns that six years have passed between the scene change and Johnny is now a conductor on the Tomahawk and Western RR and the train is about to depart. As Johnny climbs on the moving caboose, he turns and waves to Kit and his five daughters, Connie, Barbara, Mary, Marilyn and Joyce. As the train passes a certain point, a train semaphore swings up with the words...THE END

At the end of each presentation, most of you know I give some additional facts and trivia about the production, so here goes...

Where did the screenwriters come up with the five names for Kit and Johnny's girls? They used the first real names of Madame Adelaide and her four-girl dance troup. (Marilyn was the dead giveaway here.)

World premieres were still held in the states they were filmed in back in the fifties, so this one premiered at the Centre Theater in Denver on August 18, 1950.

We initially advertised this film as containing a well known person from Colorado Springs, but because this person appeared at the very end of the movie (which you didn't get to see) it would be a little hard to even try and guess who it was. When the train leaves for Tomahawk at the end of the movie, Chief Crooked Knife and some of his tribe are all on a flat car behind the locomotive. Crooked Knife is teaching his braves Johnny's "all deuces" card trick. The scene called for two squaws to also be on the flat car, but casting missed it in the notes. Director Richard Sale's wife, Mary Loos became one of the squaws (she was also the co-screenplay writer.) For the second squaw, 20th Century Fox came to the Alexander Film Co. in Colorado Springs as Alexander had a steady stock of actors on hand for their theater commercials. The person selected was Rosemary Hetzler, as she was working for Alexander at the time and was sent over. Rosemary, as most of you remember, became the Curator for the Pioneers Museum in Colorado Springs.

Well, that's a wrap, as they say in Hollywood. Hope everyone had fun at our six and a half-screenings the past two years. We have exhausted the list of films (that are worth showing) that were made in Colorado Springs or about a Springs resident and this series has come to a close. Tuesday Nights in July will be back again next year, we just don't yet know what we will be doing Keep reading your WestWord!

Midland Railroad's Colorado City Yards to be the topic of our September program


